Dear Families,

The AFL finals are upon us. Even if you don't have an interest in the code of AFL, stick with me for a moment here. What teams have performed well to this point and who has 'underperformed'? There are sides such as Melbourne, Collingwood and Hawthorn that I would rate as having a successful season for making the finals, regardless of what happens from here. Pressure remains on teams like the two Sydney teams, not to mention Richmond, to make the Grand Final if not win the Premiership. Huge concerns for Carlton, St Kilda and Gold Coast as they haven't performed nor shown much promise and need some form of intervention and support from the AFL, whereas Brisbane have experienced success despite finishing in 15th place. Power and Crows are interesting, as both have underperformed by finishing in 10th and 12th positions respectively but Crows finished the season on a positive trajectory and the Port crashed. So, one team will

ultimately be successful for winning the premiership this year. However, there are others who already should be deemed as being successful, including those making the finals and those missing out.

Here's my long-winded point and thank you if you're still reading this without any knowledge or interest in AFL.

Rightfully, we measure 'success' with having two fundamental aspects in mind. The level of achievement and the level of progress. The same principle applies with student learning.

We know that our children and young people learn and develop at different rates. The pertinent point I wish to make here, is that the emphasis on the expectation that we hold for our students to progress determines 'success', and not necessarily the achievement which is compared to other students through uniform standards or benchmarks.

Success is individual and relative. We must not accept mediocrity or complacency but must aim for high expectations that are ambitious and achievable for every student.

Relative success for every child must be attainable for every child attending Fulham North Primary School. What's achievable and ambitious for your child in regards to their learning? If you're not sure, this is the most important conversation that you can have with your child's teachers.

You may have noticed that our website has been under maintenance. On Wednesday, a number of our staff were trained in how to use the software, so we will be updating our website over the next month or so. Keep your eyes peeled for changes!

On Monday, 3 September, Fulham North staff joined with the other staff in the Western Adelaide Shores Partnership to engage in some professional development. Staff attended a range of workshops aimed at ensuring that we are engaging our students and giving them the opportunities to become powerful learners. Teachers also looked at moderating student work samples to ensure that grading is consistent across sites.

HOW TO MOTIVATE KIDS – AND WHY REWARDS AREN'T THE ANSWER

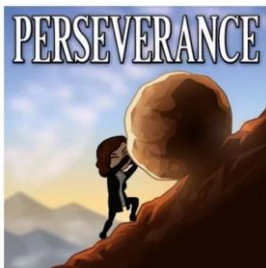
Give them a choice. Being able to choose what they'll do leads to automatic increases in motivation. Why? Your child feels volitional. He is actually choosing for himself. It's an intrinsic and internalised decision.

If your child doesn't want to choose because nothing is appealing we can consider whether our requests are reasonable. If they are, we move to the next idea.

Build up the relationship. People work hard for those they love. A child who never liked science will

turn out incredible projects when a new teacher inspires them. When a child feels our concern for their welfare, they trust us. They are open to our influence. We can guide them more successfully.

Finally, recognise that when a child feels competent, they are going to be more motivated than when they feel incapable. Our job is to build their sense of mastery so they feel like the things we invite them to do are achievable.



If you MUST offer a reward, make it unexpected. And assure your child that this isn't going to be a regular thing. When it comes to motivating our kids, our focus is misdirected. We see motivation as something they either have or don't have. If they don't have it, we try to provide it for them. Our question should not be 'How motivated are you?', but rather 'How are you motivated?' When we create conditions for motivation to be internal and autonomous, we'll never need to 'motivate' our children again.
